In addition, Gospel, Motown and other popular and classical favorites were performed by internationally acclaimed vocalist Audrey DuBois Harris.


# Creative New <u>Rochelle</u>

The Summer Reading Kickoff Party launched the Library's summer festivities for children. Over 800 children and teens participated in the Summer Reading Challenge, and over 7,600 children and adults participated in educational and engaging daily programs at both the Main Library and Huguenot Children's Library.

# NEW ROCHELLE LOVES ITS LOCAL HISTORY



"Ghosts in the Wind: A Spectral Vision of New Rochelle for Halloween", presented by NRPL Archivist David Rose, showcased the most evocative, unusual, and surprising photographs in the Photography Collection of the New Rochelle Public Library Archive.



Patrons enjoyed "Elizabeth Huntington Coley Fox: Sparks of Beauty, Shards of God" - an illustrated presentation, based on personal papers in the Library's archives, of Elizabeth Coley Fox, an artist, school teacher, and resident of New Rochelle from 1928 to 1947.

Local history presentations - always popular with the New Rochelle community - continued to attract large audiences. This year's programs included "The History of the George Washington Carver Garden Club of Westchester", "Elizabeth Huntington Coley Fox: Sparks of Beauty, Shards of God", "Ghosts in the Wind: A Spectral Vision of New Rochelle for Halloween" and "Discovering Your African American Heritage by Building a Family Tree."

Beyond the shelves, the Library continues to support the community with a range of free services throughout the year, including Civics Classes for Citizenship, English Conversation Classes, job search assistance, High School Equivalency and GED information sessions, notary public services, job fairs, Medicare information sessions and one-on-one support by our Community Outreach Specialist.

The library was awarded a grant to conduct digital literacy classes in both English and Spanish. Additionally, we partnered with STEM Alliance to offer two intensive workshops: Tech Skills for Success and Cyber Seniors.

WiFi enabled Chromebooks, iPads, and mobile hotspots, put into circulation for patrons to borrow, was well received by the community. Thanks to support from the Friends, all devices have a durable storage case, reducing the chance that devices are damaged.

# SUPPORTING THE COMMUNITY



AARP Tax Aide volunteers provided free tax advice and preparation to over 900 patrons during tax season.



WiFi enabled Chromebooks and iPads, as well as WiFi Hotspots were put into circulation this year, helping bridge the digital divide.

Our popular AARP Tax Aide program was back in full swing, providing free tax assistance to over 900 patrons in the two months leading up to tax day.

The Friends donated books to a number of organizations including a school in Haiti, a senior living facility, the local Ronald McDonald House, and the county correctional facility.

In 2024, the library will continue to develop and offer programs and services to support the needs of our diverse community.

## **News from the New Rochelle Public Library Foundation**

2023 has been a very busy and productive year. The New Rochelle Public Library Foundation sponsored Game On! at the Library, a fundraiser, which included mini golf in the stacks, games and karaoke on a Friday night in May for adults. That Saturday families were invited to play mini golf in the stacks for free.

Fundraisers such as these enable the Foundation to provide the Library with the match needed to secure New York State Construction Grants for capital improvement projects. This year the Foundation provided the Library with a total of \$162,032, half to meet two match requirements, and the balance for children's programming at the Huguenot Children's Library; the popular Museum Pass Program; and many other items that help to keep our Library vibrant and able to meet the needs of our community.


